Student Responsibility:

- 4. Check your planner again at home to see if you have all assignments completed for the following day.
- 5. Show any messages to parents or teachers.

Parent Responsibility:

- 1. Check your child's planner regularly.
- 2. Ask to see assignments listed.
- 3. Communicate with teachers through the planner or e-mail.

Teacher Responsibility:

- 1. List daily assignments and/or "I can" statements in a visible place in the classroom.
- 2. Direct students to write assignments and "I can" statements in their planner every day.
- 3. Utilize the planner to communicate grades and/or messages to parents.

BUTLER MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENT PROGRAMS

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Butler Middle School offers an excellent curricular program maximizing each student's potential. Reading, writing, mathematics, science, health and physical education are required. The basic program is enhanced by course offerings in world languages, fine arts, performing arts, and CTE. For more information call the Counseling Center.

EXTRACURRICULAR

Our school has a variety of activities for students to enjoy. Be sure to listen to announcements (also posted on Canvas) for specific details. Options include Math Counts, Lego League, Debate, Jazz Band, and Game Day. You could also get involved in a service organization such as SBO's. PTSA, NJHS or participate in the annual PTSA Reflections Contest.

The district-wide intramural sports program offers four competitions each year in cross-country (fall), chess (winter), basketball (winter), and soccer (spring).

HONOR ROLL

To qualify for honor roll, a student must earn a 3.5 or higher grade point average. Honor roll certificates will be printed and mailed home after each term for students who qualify.

NATIONAL JUNIOR HONOR SOCIETY

Students are invited to apply for membership in the National Junior Honor Society at the end of the 1st term of their eighth-grade year. To qualify, a student must have:

- a 3.6 or higher cumulative grade point average, and
- all citizenship grades must be "H" and "S".

The induction into NJHS is held in November. To retain membership status in NJHS, students must maintain qualifying grades and citizenship. The NJHS sponsors many activities including recycling, field trips, guest speakers, and service projects. NJHS has after school meetings on a regular basis. The schedule will be announced in the new school year.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT

Butler Middle School fosters student leadership. Seventh and eighth grade Student Body Officers are elected in the spring to serve for the following school year. Sixth grade elections are held at the beginning of the school year. Elections result in student representatives for each grade level.

GRADE LEVEL TEAMS

Each student at Butler Middle School is assigned to a grade level team. Each grade has two teams:

- Gummy Bears and Cinnamon Bears in 6th grade,
- Polar Bears and Panda Bears in 7th,
- Grizzly Bears and Kodiak Bears in 8th.

Approximately 160 students are assigned to each grade level team. Each grade level team has the same Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies teachers. The 4-teacher team meets on a weekly basis to better coordinate curriculum/homework/assessments and works to identify student needs.

BRUINS' DEN

Starting in September, each Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday after school homework help is available in the Media Center from 3 - 4 P.M. Two teachers supervise and help students who need additional support or resources in their learning.

Butler Middle School: Honors Pathway

Honors courses are designed to provide academically advanced students with deeper and complex learning experiences in language arts and math. Honors courses demand high levels of participation, effort, and quality from students. Curriculum in an honors course is extended beyond the core curriculum and places additional emphasis on higher-level thinking and exploring of standards at greater levels of depth and complexity.

6th Grade—In the 6th grade year, BMS offers honors designations each term within the regular ELA 6 and Math 6 courses. Honors classes in 6th grade are not common in our state or across the nation. Research and our experience shows that students this age make better academic progress in heterogenous settings. We can better support our students in 6th grade by offering extension experiences in the regular classroom throughout the school year. The curriculum is designed to be challenging and rigorous for all learners and allows growth at all levels, including students who are ready to take on the honors work. We want these extension opportunities to be available to all students. Students who are ready to add the honors challenge, can opt in at any point through their regular classes.

7th/8th Grade—BMS offers separate honors classes for ELA and math in the 7th and 8th grade. There are two honors classes in each grade level for ELA and two for math (one on each team). This structure accommodates 75 students or approximately 25% of the students in a particular grade. Placement in the honors classes is based on requests and data from the Reading Inventory, the Math Inventory and RISE tests. Parents and students are able to request placement in a honors class during the course request process in February. Course Placement into honors is done in June after the state end of year testing is available. Placement into honors classes is based on requests of proficiency based on assessments. See benchmarks below. Students and parents will be notified of placement before August.

BUTLER MIDDLE SCHOOL GENERAL INFORMATION AND SERVICES

BEFORE AND AFTER SCHOOL

Monday – Friday the school day begins at 7:55 A.M. The front doors open at 7:30 A.M. Breakfast is available at 7:30 A.M. in the cafeteria.

Monday – Thursday school ends at 2:50 P.M. Friday is an early out for students. School ends at 1:10 P.M.

Teachers will escort their 6th period classes outside of the building. Students are expected to be off-campus and on their way home by 3:00 P.M. Monday - Thursday and by 1:20 on Fridays. Students attending after school activities will reenter the building through the main office after exiting with their 6th period class and must arrange for their own transportation.

CAFETERIA - (801) 826-6845

A nutritious breakfast and lunch are served daily. The cost of breakfast is \$1.25 and \$0.30 reduced. The cost of lunch is \$2.25 and \$0.40 reduced. A computerized prepay system allows students to carry credit in an account. A student's account remains the same for as long as he or she attends Butler. Students will use their ID Badge to purchase breakfast and lunch.

Students will be given an ID badge on the first day of school. Students will need this badge to purchase breakfast and lunch in the school cafeteria. Parents can use the PayPam system to deposit money into student lunch accounts online. Students are expected to keep their lunch number CONFIDENTIAL.

Lunch account information is kept in the Cafeteria, not the Main Office. Inquiries about lunch accounts will be forwarded to the Cafeteria.

After students have finished eating lunch, they may remain in the Cafeteria or go to the outdoor commons area. **By district policy, middle school students are to remain on campus during school hours**. All who use the Cafeteria are responsible for keeping the area clean.

Food, candy, and drinks are to be consumed in the Cafeteria.

CONTACTING TEACHERS

The best way to contact teachers is through email, phone, or planner. Teachers are with students during the school day, so please expect a response within 24 - 48 hours. All questions related to grades and assignments should first be addressed with the teacher.

COUNSELING CENTER SERVICES - (801) 826-6820

The Butler Middle School Counseling Center is committed to providing guidance instructon and activities that allow ALL students the opportunity to gain knowledge of themselves and others, explore future educational and occupational options, and develop career planning stategies.

Our counseling staff is available to help in many ways. Some services they provide include individual and group counseling, schedule changes, mediation, crisis intervention, new student registration, referral to outside services, and behavior management supports.

If you wish to meet with a counselor, the secretary will take your name and concern and the counselor will contact you.

EMERGENCY DRILLS

Emergency drills are required by law. Emergency drills will generally be scheduled during the first week of each month. Students are taught how to react appropriately to fire, earthquake, and other emergencies. During an evacuation drill, students are to exit the building by the prescribed route as quickly as possible, move away from the building, and stay out of driveways. Students should remain quiet and attentive. Everyone will remain outside of the building until clearance is given to reenter. It is essential everyone promptly obey when the first signal is given.

ID BADGES

Students will be given an ID badge on the first day of school. It is expected that all students wear their **ID badge while at school**. This is a school-wide safety measure we have in place. Students will need this badge to purchase breakfast and lunch in the school cafeteria. It is also used to reward students with points through our school-wide PBIS Rewards program.

ILLNESS DURING SCHOOL DAY

In case of illness, the student should obtain a note from the teacher and go directly to the Counseling Center. If a student is too ill to remain in school, a parent/guardian will be contacted. A student who is hurt before or after school or during the lunch period should go directly to the Counseling Center.

LOCKERS

Lockers will be assigned by request. Locker requests will be opened on September 1st. Lockers are school property and are issued (by request) to students for storage of school books and school equipment. Students are responsible for keeping their lockers neat and clean both inside and out. They should not write on, scratch, carve, dent, or in any way deface the lockers. Magnetized accessories are approved. Students must use the locker assigned to them. Students who violate these regulations may lose locker privileges and may be assessed a fee to cover locker damages.

School officials reserve the right to search any or all lockers when deemed necessary. Illegal items found in lockers will be confiscated, and students to whom the lockers are assigned may face consequences. Locker combinations are changed during the summer. The school is not responsible for items stolen from lockers.

LOST AND FOUND

If you lose something, check the Lost and Found bins in the office and in the cafeteria. Bins are cleaned out on a weekly basis and lost items are donated. Butler Middle School is not responsible for any personal property which is lost, stolen, and/or vandalized.

MEDIA CENTER

Students are welcome in the Media Center on school days with a pass before or after school. Our Media Center is designed to be a place where students feel safe and welcome. Students are invited to the Media Center to read, study, visit, relax, play games, and learn.

- Lunch Passes are available most days. Please pick them up before school or before lunch.
- Please do not bring any food or drink into the Media Center.
- Students may check out up to 5 books at a time.
- If you visit the GREAT Room during class, please bring a note from your teacher.
- Please ask for book recommendations or homework help any time!

Students who do not behave properly in the Media Center will be asked to leave.

MEDICATION AT SCHOOL

Medication may only be administered to a student by school personnel if:

- the student's parent or legal guardian has provided a current written and signed request that medication be administered to the student during regular school hours.
- the student's medical provider has provided a signed statement describing the method, amount, and time schedule for administration and a statement that administration of medication by school employees is medically necessary.

Medication forms are available at the school counseling center.

Acetaminophen or ibuprofen may be given by the school nurse or other trained school employees to any student after consulting with a parent regarding the need and obtaining verbal permission each time administered.

NONDISCRIMINATION

It is the policy of Canyons School District not to discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, or handicapping condition in any educational program.

REPORT CARDS

Report cards and midterm progress reports are posted on Skyward. An email notification will be sent to parents and guardians. You will need your login information for Skyward to access these reports. If you do not have your login information, please contact the Main Office at (801) 826-6800 where they can assist you.

TECHNOLOGY TOOLS

Skyward Student – This tool is used to track grades and attendance information. Each student is assigned a login name and password at the beginning of the school year. You may access Skyward Student at http://butlermiddle.canyonsdistrict.org. Please contact the Main Office for login information.

Canvas Student – This is an instructional tool used to house curriculum resources for each class. Student login information and password is the same as Skyward. You may access Canvas at http://butlermiddle.canvonsdistrict.org.

TELEPHONE USE

Students are not released from class to accept or make telephone calls except in cases of illness or serious emergency. The school can relay messages from parents to students during the school day. Students are allowed to use cell phones before school and after school. We ask that parents do not call or text students on their cell phones during school hours. If necessary, please contact the Main Office to leave a message for your student.

VISITORS

All visitors should check in at the Main Office. Student visitors are not allowed. Parents coming into the school must check-in at the Main Office to pick up a visitor's badge. 24-hour notification is needed to observe a class. This request must be approved through school administration. This is for the protection of students.

BUTLER MIDDLE SCHOOL EXPECTATIONS

ATTENDANCE POLICY (Board Policy 500.35)

Butler Middle is making a special effort to ensure that all students fully benefit from their education by attending school regularly. We have set a schoolwide goal of reducing absenteeism by encouraging students to *Be* **GREAT**, *Miss Less Than Eight*. Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Your child can start building this habit now. Consistent attendance will help children do well in high school, college, and at work.

Did You Know?

- Research shows that students who miss even a few days of school each month are at far greater risk of academic failure and dropout than students who attend regularly.
- Starting in kindergarten, too many absences (excused and unexcused) can cause children to fall behind in school.
- <u>Missing two days of school per month</u> increases the chance that your student will not read or master math at the same level as their peers.
- Being late to school can lead to poor attendance.
- Absences affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three indicators that a student may drop out of high school.
- By being present at school, your child learns valuable social skills and has the opportunity to develop meaningful relationships with other students and school staff.

What We Need From You

We miss your child when they are gone and we value their contributions to our school. We would like you to help ensure that your child attends regularly and is successful in school. If your child is going to be absent, please contact Ms. Melissa Christensen in the Attendance Office - (801) 826 – 6810

Attendance Tips For Parents

- Let your children know that you think showing up for school every day is important.
- Take an interest in your child's school work and be involved in school activities.
- Post the school calendar somewhere prominently in the home.
- Establish a routine and healthy school-night habits, such as getting to bed early and reading before bed, instead of watching TV/playing on electronic devices.
- Set the morning alarm early enough to provide students ample time to get dressed and eat breakfast.
- Support your children in getting to school on time: Give them a ride if they're running late or they miss the bus, or arrange to carpool with other families.
- Try to schedule doctor and dental appointments after school.

School attendance is mandated by the Utah Compulsory Attendance Law 53A-11-101. Accordingly, students are expected to be in class and attend school-sponsored activities. Consistent attendance is vital to academic success. Frequent absence disrupts the educational process and reduces chances for interaction with teachers and peers, classroom participation, learning experiences, and other valuable opportunities. Once lost, many of these benefits cannot be regained.

ATTENDANCE PROCEDURES

Absences

There are times when a student cannot attend school. Reasons for excused absences include illness, medical appointments, family wedding, death of family member or other close friend, family emergencies, family activity (Educational Leave), or court appearance.

When a student is absent from school for one or more periods, a parent or guardian should call the school on the day of the absence stating the reason and duration. We encourage parents to call the Attendance Office at 801-826-6810.

<u>All absences beyond 5 days</u> MUST be excused by a doctor's note or documentation of a family emergency. If a student will be out of town for three days or more, an Educational Leave form must be completed at least five days prior to the absence. Educational Leave is granted for a maximum of ten days per school year.

The school utilizes an automated calling system to notify parents of absences. In addition, all absences are recorded on the Skyward Student system. Parents/guardians and students can access attendance and check academic progress by going to the Butler webpage http://butlermiddle.canyonsdistrict.org and clicking on the Skyward Student link.

Checking-In

Students who arrive at school after 8:05 A.M. must check in at the Attendance Office. An excused tardy (or absence) will be recorded if the student has a signed and dated note from a parent. If a student does not have a note, an unexcused absence/tardy will be recorded for the class periods missed prior to checking in to school.

Checking-Out

When it is necessary for a student to leave school during the regular school day, a parent or guardian may call the Attendance Office, or, the student may provide a note. The note must be signed by a parent or guardian, stating the date and time the student is to check out and a phone number where a parent or guardian may be contacted to verify the reason for the check out.

Before the student leaves the school, a parent or guardian must come to the Attendance Office with a photo ID to check the student out.

Truancy

Middle schools in Canyons School District operate under a "closed campus" policy. Students are to remain on campus throughout the school day unless they have been properly checked out of school according to the procedures outlined above.

Students are considered truant for the following reasons:

- being absent from school for any portion of the school day (including lunch) without the consent of a parent, guardian, or school official
- leaving school without properly checking out through the attendance office
- obtaining permission to go to a certain place but not reporting there
- arriving more than 10 minutes late for a class
- leaving class without permission

BACKPACKS

Backpacks are allowed to be brought into classrooms. For safety reasons we ask that only essential items be stored in backpacks to keep the size manageable. Backpacks cannot be taken to the cafeteria during lunch. The school is not responsible for lost or stolen items from student backpacks.

DANGEROUS OR DISRUPTIVE CONDUCT - (Board Policy 500.02)

The following conduct is defined as dangerous or disruptive and is prohibited on school property, at school-sponsored activities and while traveling in school-funded or school-dispatched vehicles:

- 1. Possession, control, or actual or threatened use of a real weapon, explosive, or noxious or flammable material;
 - a. the actual or threatened use of a look alike weapon with intent to intimidate another person or to disrupt normal school activities;
 - b. the sale, control, or distribution of a drug or controlled substance, an imitation substance, or drug paraphernalia; or


- c. an act involving force or threatened use of force which if committed would be a felony or class A misdemeanor
- 2. Frequent or flagrant willful disobedience, defiance of property authority, or disruptive behavior, including
 - a. the use of foul, profane, vulgar, or abusive language;
 - b. willful destruction or defacing of school property;
 - c. behavior or threatened behavior which poses an immediate and significant threat to the welfare or safety of other students or school personnel or to the operation of the school;
 - d. possession, control, or use of an alcoholic beverage;
 - e. behavior that threatens harm to the school property, to a person associated with the school, or property associated with the person;
 - f. or Possession of pornographic material on school property.
- 3. Students with prior knowledge of dangerous and disruptive behavior have the duty to report such behavior to school administration. Students that fail to report such behavior are subject to appropriate disciplinary sanctions.

HARASSMENT (Board Policy 500.02)

The Board of Education authorizes school administrators to take appropriate action to preserve order among the students and staff and to protect school property. Acts of harassment, cyberbullying, bullying, violence, use or possession of a weapon or facsimile, criminal behavior, and gang activity in or about district schools, property, or activities are dealt with in accordance to district policy and the law.

DRESS CODE: SCHOOL DRESS, GROOMING, AND APPEARANCE (Policy 500.02)

- 1. Students shall dress in a manner suitable to the day's activities consistent with the standards of health, safety, and acceptable behavior.
- 2. Student clothing and accessories must not present a health or safety hazard or distraction, which would disrupt the educational mission. Disruption is defined as reactions by other individuals to the clothing or adornment, which causes the teacher/administrator to lose the attention of students, to modify or cease instructional activities, or deal with student confrontations or complaints.
- 3. Clothing: (See, figure)



- 1. Must cover the body as outlined in the figure with a fabric that is not see through, with no viewable undergarments.
- 2. Shall be free from writing, images or symbols that:
 - 1. are lewd, vulgar, profane, obscene, violent, or sexually suggestive.
 - 2. advocate, represent, or promote racism, discrimination, violence or hate in any form.
 - 3. Signifies or depicts gangs or illegal or criminal activities.
 - School officials will determine what constitutes "gang" clothing, colors, and paraphernalia after consultation with law enforcement agencies as needed.
- 4. The student dress code standards include, but are not limited to the following:
 - 1. All students shall wear clean clothing.
 - 2. Shoes shall be worn at all times to ensure personal safety and hygiene.
 - 3. Items that disrupt the educational mission shall not be allowed.

- 4. Clothing that may draw undue attention, disrupt, or pose a health or safety issue, or interfere with the learning atmosphere, shall not be allowed.
- 5. Items which bear advertising, promotions and likeness of tobacco, e-cigarettes, alcohol, or drugs or which are contrary to the educational mission, shall not be allowed.
- 6. Personal items such as clothing, paraphernalia, jewelry, backpacks, gym bags, water bottles, etc., shall be free of writing, pictures, or any other insignias, which are crude, vulgar, profane, violent, or sexually suggestive.
- 7. Students shall comply with the laws that govern wearing military uniforms and insignias (<u>Title 10</u>) USC § 771-772, and <u>Army Regulations 670 1 §29-4</u>.
- 5. Accommodations must be made for students whose religious beliefs are substantially affected by dress code requirements.
- 6. School officials may require students to wear certain types of clothing for health and safety reasons in connection with certain specialized activities.
- 7. Students who violate dress code provisions may be subject to student discipline and due process procedures must be followed.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL POLICY (Board Policy 500.02)

The administration recognizes that the possession, use, or distribution of illegal drugs, alcoholic beverages, or other prohibited substances constitutes a hazard to students and is disruptive to the educational process. The following substances are prohibited at school:

- Illegal drugs and associated paraphernalia
- Alcoholic beverages
- Illegal psycho-toxic chemicals (inhalants)
- Prescription medications in excess of an 8-hour dosage
- Over-the-counter medications in excess of an 8-hour dosage
- Tobacco products
- Electronic Cigarettes or vaping paraphenalia

The possession, use, or distribution, by students of any substance listed above is prohibited on school district property, during school hours, and at any school-sponsored extracurricular program or activity including those held off school property. Violations will result in the strict application of Canyons School District's Drug and Alcohol Policy 500.02.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Personal electronic devices and accessories (i.e., headphones) designed for entertainment purposes are strongly discouraged during school hours. **Students are expected to keep personal devices in their locker, backpack, or pockets at all times.** Cell phones and/or other electronic devices may be confiscated if they disrupt the educational process or environment. Any use of an electronic device that exploits personal information, disrupts the educational process, invades personal privacy or compromises the integrity of educational programs is strictly prohibited. Butler Middle School will not assume responsibility for personal items.

SUSPENSION POLICY (Board Policy 500.02).

Canyons School District students and employees are entitled to a learning/working environment that is free from unlawful and violent acts. Therefore, the Canyons District Board of Education shall not tolerate acts of violence, use or possession of weapons, criminal behavior or gang activity in schools, on school property, or at or around school activities. Students whose actions pose a threat to the health and/or safety of a student or staff member may be suspended to a district level hearing

TARDIES

Tardies occur when a student is not on time to any one class period. At Butler Middle School "on time" is defined as being in your seat, ready to work when it is time for class to begin. Tardies have a disruptive impact on a class and have a number of unfavorable consequences for a student. Excessive tardies will: 1) have an impact on a student's citizenship grade; 2) count toward attendance consequences; and 3) possibly result in detention. We recommend that parents and students follow their absences and tardies carefully on Skyward in order to be successful here at Butler Middle School and avoid any negative consequences that may occur.

Warning Signs for Suicide and Corresponding Actions


Call 9-1-1 or seek immediate help from a mental health provider when you hear or see any of these behaviors:

- Someone threatening to hurt or kill himself, or talking of wanting to hurt or kill himself
- Someone looking for ways to kill herself by seeking access to firearms, available pills, or other means
- Someone talking or writing about death, dying, or suicide, when these actions are out of the ordinary for the person

Seek help by contacting a mental health professional or calling the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-TALK (8255) for a referral should you witness, hear, or see someone exhibiting one or more of these behaviors:

- Hopelessness
- Rage, uncontrolled anger, seeking revenge
- Acting reckless or engaging in risky activities, seemingly without thinking
- Feeling trapped-like there's no way out
- Withdrawing from friends, family, and society
- Anxiety, agitation, unable to sleep or sleeping all the time
- Dramatic mood changes
- No reason for living; no sense of purpose in life

Email the teacher and ask to meet before school the following morning to get additional instructions.
Complete what you can and after walking through it with an adult, write a note on the assignment to the teacher explaining what you do not understand. Writing "I don't get it" does not allow anyone to help you. Explain what you do know, and what you don't.

What else can you do when you have completed practice assignments?

Re-read and/or annotate the notes from class. Generate review questions from your notes.
Check planner for upcoming tests or project due dates. Study in small chunks each night until the test day. Work towards completing projects each night.
Create study guides or graphic organizers for yourself.
Attempt more challenging problems.
Re-read or read ahead in textbooks. Annotate your reading.






